Overview:

Established in 1998 as the Center for Northeast Asian Policy Studies, CEAP is part of the Brookings Institution's Foreign Policy program and is a center for research, analysis, and exchange on the compelling policy challenges facing East Asia and U.S.-Asia relations. CEAP implements program activities in two program tracks: an active series of events on political, economic, and security issues and scholarly research and publication. Drawing on the Brookings Institution's long-standing ties to the region, CEAP is a leading venue for transpacific policy dialogue, research, and publication devoted to East Asia. The Center is directed by Dr. Richard Bush, a senior fellow in Brookings's Foreign Policy program, and the Chen-Fu and Cecilia Yen Koo Chair in Taiwan Studies. Responsibilities:

The Center for East Asia Policy Studies (CEAP) at the Brookings Institution is accepting applications for a Visiting Fellow from Taiwan.

During the 2017 program year, CEAP will give preference to applications that include research proposals focused on how Taiwan can maintain its economic competitiveness in an era of globalization and technological change, and in the context of an advancing Chinese economy. Applications for the 2017 program year must be submitted by June 2, 2017. Applicants will be notified of the results in late June 2017.

The Visiting Fellow will be drawn from the mid- to senior-level ranks of Taiwan's academic community, and should expect to repatriate and contribute to that community after the fellowship. The Fellow will be selected on a highly competitive basis, following a careful review of all applications. The applicant selected for the fellowship is eligible for a stipend, to support living expenses, of up to \$5,000 USD per month for a period of four to six months to begin on July 3, 2017. Brookings will follow U.S. tax guidelines regarding tax withholding and reporting on stipend payments. Brookings will provide a workspace, networked desktop computer, an individual network account, and access to Brookings research resources. Assistance with the visa application process will be provided; however, Brookings cannot guarantee the issuance of a visa. As part of the visa process, the Visiting Fellow will be required to take an online English proficiency assessment. The Visiting Fellow will be eligible to participate in the Institution's medical insurance plan during the period of appointment, at his/her expense. Immediate family members accompanying the Visiting Fellow may also be included at an additional charge.

During the fellowship, the Visiting Fellow will conduct self-directed individual research and collaborative activities, interact with other scholars and professionals around the community, and take part in the wide array of policy seminars and discussions available at Brookings and other organizations. The Brookings Institution's location and convening power give the Visiting Fellow the opportunity to hear views from and interact with scholars and experts, opinion leaders.

Qualifications:

Applicant Requirements

- · A Ph.D. in economics, political science, international relations, history, or a related discipline is required.
- Applicants should hold a tenure track position at a university in Taiwan.
- Applicants should have at least 6-8 years of professional experience in universities or policy research organizations with practical
 or scholarly exposure to current political, security, or economic trends in the region.
- . In addition to Chinasa language fluores, applicants must have a demonstrated ability to conduct professional in death research

and deliver spoken presentations in English.

Program Requirements

- The Visiting Fellow must be available for a full-time affiliation with The Brookings Institution for the entire four to six-month program, beginning July 3, 2017 and ending no later than December 31, 2017.
- The Visiting Fellow is required to research and write a working paper (minimum 6,000 words, maximum 8,000 words) on policy
 topic agreed to with the CEAP director. A final draft of the paper is due by the end of October 2017; CEAP staff will work with the
 Visiting Fellow for the remainder of the Fellowship term to edit and proof-read the paper before publication on the Brookings
 website.
- The Visiting Fellow may present his or her paper at a Brookings seminar during the course of the Fellowship.
- The Visiting Fellow must be familiar with and uphold the Brookings Institution's commitment to independent, nonpartisan research and publication, and to maintaining the highest level of integrity in pursuit of this mission.
- The Visiting Fellow is expected to be an active participant in Brookings and CEAP activities, including but not limited to regularly
 organized discussions and attending CEAP discussions, seminars, presentations, press briefings, and other CEAP and
 Brookings events.

Application Information

Applications for the 2017 program must be submitted by June 2, 2017. Applicants will be notified of the results in late June 2017.

Applications should consist of five elements:

- 1. The applicant's resume or curriculum vitae, listing professional and educational experience, and publications (noting publications in English);
- 2. A detailed 2000-word research proposal for a "working paper" to be researched and written at Brookings during the Visiting Fellowship. This paper is considered to be the main product of the Visiting Fellowship, and the proposal is an important part of the application.

In 2017, CEAP will give preference to research proposals focused on how Taiwan can maintain its economic competitiveness in an era of globalization and technological change, and in the context of an advancing Chinese economy.

Candidates should submit a detailed working paper proposal as part of the application. The proposal should be at least 2000 words (roughly four pages) and should include the following:

- · A preliminary title and statement of the topic.
- An explanation of the problem or policy issue to be examined and the anticipated conclusion.
- A description of the paper's organization and substantive components.
- · A brief discussion of the analytical framework and research methods to be utilized.
- A statement of objectives to be met in researching this topic and completing this paper.
- An assessment of how the paper would contribute to the policy community's understanding of the issue.
- An explanation of the impact that living in Washington would have on research of this topic.
- 3. Detailed written responses to the following questions:
 - How would this Visiting Fellowship, and more broadly your tenure at Brookings, advance your career?
 - How would you use experiences you gain during your tenure at Brookings when you return to Taiwan? How would they contribute to your home institution and your work?
 - Which organizations and experts would you most like to have contact with during your CEAP fellowship?
- 4. One writing sample in English, on topics related to domestic or foreign policy, or the topic listed above. The writing sample should be at least 2500 words (roughly five single-spaced pages) and should not have been edited by a third party.
- 5. Letters of reference from three supervisors or professional colleagues. Letters can be sent directly to Brookings by the authors or can be included in the application package.

Please upload your curriculum vitae, research proposal, and written answers as one document when you apply. The writing sample and reference letters may be uploaded as separate documents; reference letters may also be emailed directly to CEAP.
